Byfleet Library risk of closing— Message from resident

As you've probably heard, our local library is 1 of 11 in Surrey under threat of closing by Surrey County Council following a review study into the 'public value' of Surrey libraries. Following an independent investigation and pressure from local residents, the Council have now admitted to errors in their Public Value Review study and the study will now be audited. This follows the disclosure of multiple errors in their basic data. 'Surrey Libraries Action Movement' is a group of volunteers established to fight the closures in Surrey and has helped push for the audit. The action group is supported by Jonathan Lord, MP and Geoff Marlow, our local county councillor.

Action group members are passionate about campaigning to keep our library open for use by local residents. So much so, they organised a protest rally outside Kingston Crown Court on the 26th July with over 80 protesters in attendance. The largest protest rally KCC has ever seen. The next meeting is scheduled for the 9th of August – to meet with David Hodge, Deputy Head of SCC. Mr Hodge is responsible for the initial proposal to make changes to Surrey libraries.

You would be hard pressed not to notice the transformation taking place on our porches and pathways. Years of grit, grime and moss have been steamed away making them look new and bright. All wall lights are now of a similar style to the original Span design and ongoing efforts are being made to replace the green bollard lenses. The council will be replacing the street lighting soon as part of their updating schedule. We have even changed the lighting at the entrance utilising and upward beam emphasising the Weymede sign and slate plaque.

Drains continue to wreak havor due to inappropriate flushing of wipes, cotton buds, feminine products and other inappropriate debris. Drain clearage and repairs to affected pipes is ongoing. This situation has been problematic for some residents. You can just imagine the odour and overflow in gardens and porch areas has left a lot to be desired. Please remember our drains are now quite old, delicate and are foul and costly exercise to maintain. This affects us all financially by way of maintenance fees and we have only ourselves to blame. We ask that you be vigilant about what you are flushing down your loos.

Gate locks have needed addressing on several occasions over the last year. Some are due to people climbing over the gates, throwing them out of alignment. Recently a locksmith was called out as the locking mechanism to the electric fuse board appeared to be gunged up with an orange dusty substance. It appeared we had bee's set up home inside the cupboard. At least we weren't to blame for that one!

Car Parking

Please be considerate of your neighbours and communal grounds when parking your cars and avoid taking up too much space. Several times cars are found to be parked badly preventing additional parking opportunities. We have recently invested in repairs to the granite sets that edge the lawns and planted areas as these are regularly damaged when cars mount the curb.

Despite previous communications, cars continue to park on the corners outside HN 60-65. This prevents the bin collection lorries from using the road and forcing them onto the lawn area. At the very least, please avoid parking in these areas on Sunday evenings to prevent this problem occurring on collection day.
